Bergen Leaders To Present Public Forum on Suburban Downtowns

Bergen County: The 2015 Class of Bergen LEADS, Bergen County's premier civic leadership program, will present "Revitalizing and Refocusing Bergen County Suburban Downtowns" at a Public Forum on Tuesday, June 9, 2015 from 2:30-4:30 pm at the Ciccone Theater at Bergen Community College. The Public Forum is an opportunity for Bergen LEADS participants to present their class project, which is part of the 10-month learning and leadership development program managed by the Volunteer Center of Bergen County.

The 2015 Class of Bergen LEADS will present their findings on understanding the issues and challenges facing diverse suburban downtowns. One important change that is taking place is Bergen County is that we are beginning to come together and identify ourselves as suburbanites. We do so because our fates will not be determined solely by the individual towns or villages we live in and are proud of but rather involve the larger venue of the "middle landscape." We have learned this from our fellow citizens and their leaders who have united regionally and nationally under the banners of "urban" and "rural" to share information and develop resources to enhance life in cities, small towns and farms. We can and must see the wider picture especially during this period of suburban transformation.

"There is a need to create a dialogue that brings attention to the role of suburban downtowns in our wider Bergen County community," says William "Pat" Schuber, former Bergen County Executive and Bergen LEADS seminar director. "The Bergen LEADS Class of 2015 is confronting that challenge head on, and invites the public to be a part of the conversation."

The Public Forum will be moderated by Francis Reiner, an accomplished professional planner, urban designer and landscape architect with more than 20 years of experience working in both the public and private sector. Reiner has extensive experience working with municipalities on the design and development of mixed use, urban infill, transit oriented and traditional neighborhood developments, including the Hackensack Downtown Rehabilitation and Redevelopment Plan.
