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## Volunteer Mentors Inspire by Example Training sessions planned during National Volunteer Week

<u>North Jersey</u>— Becoming a mentor is a significant way to make a difference in the community and in people's lives. Men and women are needed to participate in two mentoring programs of the Volunteer Center of Bergen County. The mentors in both programs listen, share ideas and offer encouragement which empowers the person they are mentoring to make positive and healthy choices.

Through the **Mentoring Youth program**, caring men and women provide guidance, friendship and support to children ages 2 to 18 who are confronted with social, emotional and behavioral challenges. Currently there are over 100 children waiting to be matched with caring, supportive mentors. **Mentoring Moms** are women who make a difference in the lives of overwhelmed mothers of all ages. The volunteers spend time with mothers who have difficulty in coping with parenting, managing households, providing for their children or overcoming other obstacles. At any given time, there can be up to a dozen mothers who are waiting for the support of mentors.

Mentoring Moms begins its 6-week training session on Monday, April 16<sup>th</sup> ; Mentoring Youth will meet on 6 consecutive Wednesdays beginning on April 18<sup>th</sup>. Both trainings are from 7:00 pm to 9:30 pm at the Volunteer Center offices at 64 Passaic St. in Hackensack.

During the mentor training sessions, the volunteers are taught to develop good listening and communication skills and discuss such issues as problem solving and

values. Guest speakers, including current mentors and social services case workers share their experiences so that new mentors have the background and knowledge to help support their mentees. All mentors undergo a comprehensive screening process which includes fingerprinting and other background checks. Currently, there is an especially critical need for bi-lingual Spanish speaking men and women to become mentors.

"The theme for National Volunteer Week is 'Celebrating People in Action," says Janet Sharma, Executive Director of the Volunteer Center. "To be a mentor is to be a vital, important and positive influence on the life of someone who can use a guiding hand or a sympathetic ear. Mentors truly touch the lives of others for the better."
